BACKSTORY

Over a decade ago, I started working as a professional climate organizer for a large international non-profit based in Canada. Like most Western climate activism, our work was focused on trying to keep fossil fuels in the ground in order to mitigate the effects of climate change. I helped organize marches and federal lobbying. I supported the training of thousands of people for collective acts of civil disobedience and was arrested 6 times in 3 countries for direct action.

In 2011, Typhoon Sendong struck the Philippines the week before Christmas. My cousin Sheila's community - Cagayan De Oro - was devastated. My cousins saved their paraplegic Grandfather, Jon Jon, by hoisting him out of the rising flood onto the roof of his home using electrical extension cords. Everyone in my family survived, but 2546 people died in that storm. In the aftermath, the government decreed that the neighborhood where my cousin's family lived was now uninhabitable. They were never allowed to return to their home and lost all the money they had invested in buying the land and building their house.

While visiting my cousin I got to meet families that had been relocated to new housing built for storm survivors. I was stunned to find that the housing had been built by Shell Oil, one of the world's biggest climate culprits and a corporation I had spent years campaigning against. This experience left me wondering why I don't see Western climate organizations supporting the needs of those most impacted by climate change. As a result, I decided to start shifting my focus from attempts to mitigate future climate change to supporting the needs of those already enduring its destruction on the frontlines of the crisis.







Hollywood films like to brag about how many cineplex screens they open on, but, our film is different. Our film's release will be promoted through a series of screenings in communities harshly impacted by climate change. From communities stricken by wildfires in Greece, towns facing drought in Brazil - we're already building a coalition of partners who want to screen this film on the varied frontlines of the climate crisis. In the fall of 2019 we will bring Marissa Cabaljao to North America for a speaking tour and series of screenings in large cities. These events will occur in the lead up to the international release of the film on November 8th, 2019 - the 6 year anniversary of the storm. The film's release will be accompanied by a set of online tools to help supporters host decentralized local screenings. We're already fielding requests to host screenings all over the world, from living rooms to public libraries. In conjunction with the release of the film we will launch a crowdfunding campaign to support the families of Anibong in securing new housing. The creative and technical team behind our film has worked on over a dozen successful crowdfunding campaigns in the past, helping raise over a million dollars for everything from refugee families, to electoral organizing and Indigenous legal battles. We're experts at impact storytelling and this will be our biggest passion project to date - but we can't do it without you.
